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Pet Health: Why Vaccinate?

Vaccination or immunization can be used to booster the body's immunity defence against infectious agents. In an individual animal, the goal of vaccination is prevention of disease. Puppies and kittens receive a series of vaccines ending at a time when we know the baby's own immune system should be able to respond.

WHY DO I NEED TO HAVE MY PET VACCINATED ANNUALLY?

Vaccines are licensed based on the minimum duration they can be expected to last. We know our vaccines last at least one year and we haven't been willing to take a chance on whether they might last longer without knowing for sure.

TITER VERSUS ANNUAL VACCINATION

Should we perform annual antibody titers in patients rather than annually booster by vaccination? At this time there are no standardized laboratory methods in Canada or the USA for determining antibody concentration in the blood. Antibody titer does not necessarily correlate with protection, that is, a high titer does not mean the dog or cat is protected from getting the disease and vice versa with a low titer. In the next few years genetically engineered vaccines, called recombinant vaccines, will predominate. These types of vaccines will not produce antibody that is measurable in the form of a titer.

VACCINE SAFETY

For most vaccines available today it must be assumed that the benefits of vaccination far outweigh the risk of vaccine-induced illness or disease. Guidelines for vaccine protocols centre on core and non-core vaccines. What makes a vaccine a core Vaccine? - 1) Severity of disease, 2) Risk of transmissibility of the agent to other animals, 3) Potential for an infectious agent to be passed onto people. Non-core vaccines are recommended when a known or likely risk is anticipated or when an animal's lifestyle represents a reasonable risk. The best advice is to ask your veterinarian what vaccines are necessary based on risk assessment and lifestyle of your pet.

WHAT TYPE OF VACCINE REACTIONS CAN BE SEEN?

Vaccine reactions are unusual but possible. Allergic reactions characterized by facial swelling and hives have occurred. The incidence of vaccine associated tumours in cats at injection sites is 1:10,000 and more investigation

needs to occur to positively associate this type of tumour with vaccination using adjuvented-type vaccines in cats. The association between immune mediated hemolytic anemia and vaccines has not been proven either. At this time sufficient scientific data is lacking for both of the above reactions. Having said that, vaccination is a medical procedure and the veterinarian has an obligation to assess each patient's health status with respect to age, lifestyle and risk of exposure and infection when making the medical decision to vaccinate. It is our responsibility to our patients to keep abreast of the current guidelines when helping you, our clients, make the decision to vaccinate and together we can help your poet live a healthy life.





It appears Spring has Sprung into Pugwash. With the onset of temperate weather many people in the community shall be returning to their boats for both work and play. As such, boating safety becomes a focal point for the community. All boaters are encouraged to make safety their number one concern.

Here are some quick pointers for the boaters of Pugwash:

- ensure that every boat has enough certified life jackets in good condition and sized appropriately for each person aboard
- ensure all safety equipment (bailers, manual propulsion, waterproof lights, flares, fire extinguishers, lights, radar deflectors, whistles, horns etc....)are: available, in good condition and in sufficient quantity to satisfy the legal requirements
- ensure all operators of pleasure boats have their pleasure boat operators course and carry the proof of this training when operating a vessel
- always remember boating and alcohol don't mix

The Pugwash RCMP's main focus for boating is **safety**. Please educate yourself with regard to the requirements for your pleasure craft. To assist with this, we have Safe Boating Guides available for distribution at the Pugwash RCMP office. Recently, the Office for Safe Boating provided a training session to Ground Search and Rescue members. The main goal of this training was to have people available in the community who could provide education on boating as well as safety evaluations for those boaters who requested. With this in mind, the public can contact the local Pugwash Ground Search and Rescue for safe boating material or to request a Courtesy Safety Boating evaluation.


