Pugwash Fire Department Ready for Water Rescue

The Pugwash Fire Department has a good news story this pandemic.

Just over 14 months ago, about one

week before everything locked down last March, the Pugwash Fire Department reached its fundraising goal of just over \$90,000 for a new rescue boat. A few days later the order was placed for the boat, with expected delivery by June/July ready to be used in 2020. Little did any of us know what was to come. Due to the pandemic, the manufacturing of the boat significantly delayed the delivery of the boat until the end of the season. We were able to get the boat in the water to complete a couple of test

drives, which thankfully identified a few things that needed to be corrected.

that has come out of Over the winter months of 2020/2021 we were able to complete all the work that was required and, as of a couple of months ago, we declared the boat fully operational. The Pugwash Yacht Club has very kindly allowed us to berth the boat at their dock during the summer months at no cost. This is very much appreciated, thank you.

> When the Yacht Club docks are not in the boat is still available, but is on a trailer at the fire station, so it will take a few extra minutes to deploy. As with any emergency, please call 911 if water rescue is needed. Welcome aboard 'Rescue 6'!

Moving Ahead Expanding Laundry Services

Work has begun at Sunset Industries on Crowley Road to replace their existing laundry facility with an expanded service. Sunset has processed laundry for many years for a handful of commercial clients and cottagers who visit in the summer months. The demand for service has grown far beyond their current capacity. The work of the laundry service is done by participants of the Sunset Industries' programs with the support of staff.



Sunset's new laundry will more than double their handling capacity in both their drop-off service to the public, as well laundry processing for their commercial clients. Sunset has no plans to offer a coin cooperated, (do-your-own) laundry service at its site in Pugwash, like they have in Oxford. The drop-off service provides same day or next day pick-up options depending how late in the day laundry is brought in.

The Spring Migratory Bird Count was very successful thanks to the input of home-feeder watchers and the dedication of Sarah Witney and Betty Hodgson who spent long hours alone in the fields and forests. A total of more than 800 birds representing 70 different species were identified. The songs of multiple species of warblers, sparrows, oven birds and robins made being out in the forest a true pleasure.

The FOPE hiking trails continue to be a valuable resource for the community. Most often individuals or groups arrive separately and are naturally spaced out on the trail, making hiking a safe activity with COVID restrictions. The most frequent com-

ment we hear from hikers on the trail is "It is so nice to just get out...." A special thanks to Greg and Alvina Nix for the work they did, (alone, because we could not have a work party), improving the treadway over wet patches on the Estuary Trail.

FOPE is still hoping to have "an event on the water" this summer if restrictions are eased back, so keep an eye out for posters, hopefully in July. FOPE is also partnering with Clean Foundation funded by the community contributions to the Raise the Roof Fund. Salmon Federation to review the fresh water stream accesses to the Pugwash Estuary but when that work can start remains uncertain. FOPE will be a virtual participant to the Nature Nova Scotia "Celebration" of Nature and AGM" at the end of May and will continue to monitor and participate in programs and issues affecting the environment and welfare of the Pugwash Estuary.







Local Trail Organizations Collaborating on Multiple Projects

An abandoned rail trail that starts at the Salt Mine and ends at Pugwash Junction connects to the internationally famous Trans Canada Trail. Local trail groups have been keeping the trail open for the general public to enjoy in all seasons with snowmobiles, ATVs, cross country skis and snowshoes.

The Cumberland Trails Association received a trail management agreement from the Deptartment of Lands and Forestry to manage the trail along with local ATV and Snowmobile Clubs after going through a two year, 10 step process. The Salt Mine is granting a long term easement to connect this trail to Crowley Road permanently.

Cumberland Trails has a plan to surface this trail similar to trails near Tatamagouche so that scooters, wheelchairs and bicycles can enjoy this trail.

There are two bridges and one historic arch culvert on the Pugwash Trail. One bridge is being replaced by the Route Six Snowmobile Club with most of the funding coming from the Off Highway Infrastructure Fund (trail passes) and their hard fundraising efforts at Hackney Creek.

The Cumberland Trails Association is restoring the Docherty Creek Arch Culvert and building a bridge over the top of it to preserve it for future generations to enjoy and ensure the Pugwash trail stays open.

We are working on establishing an attractive Trans Canada Trailhead for Pugwash. Local clubs are working at hard surfacing the trail between Oxford and Colchester. Sunrise ATV Club is working on improving the link between Wallace and Wentworth including major restoration work on the Wallace River Bridge ready for a Fall inspection.

The Docherty Creek Bridge and Culvert Restoration Project is nearly 85 percent complete but we could always use help. This project is being built by the people of Cumberland County and our friends and neighbours.

North Cumberland Memorial Hospital Redevelopment Project

Work has continued on the redevelopment project for North Cumberland Memorial Hospital with the steering committee meeting monthly to ensure all aspects of the project remain on schedule. The tender for the construction of the new health facility closed on June 4, 2021. The tender is expected to be awarded in July after the required evaluation process.

The new hospital will be located on land between the present hospital and East Cumberland Lodge on Gulf Shore Road in the village of Pugwash. Nomination papers will be available 24 days before election date Complete nomination papers must be delivered to the Village Clerk Treasurer 10 days before the election date. The election will be a Saturday Nomination papers must include signatures from five Village nominating electors.

To be eligible for the Commission, a candidate must be 18 years old or older on the day of the election and Canadian citizen. Candidates for the Village Commission must also normally reside within the Village of Pugwash and have lived in the Village for at least six months.

The same qualifications apply to electors. There is no advance poll or proxy vote permitted.
