

# FOPE Summer Events of 2016

The Friends of the Pugwash Estuary (FOPE) have had a busy and productive summer. We took part in both the Canada Day/ Gathering of the Clans celebrations and the HarbourFest events. About a dozen people enjoyed paddling (swimming) out to Victoria Island for a picnic lunch during HarbourFest. Our Annual Flotilla was well attended with 37 canoes/kayaks "floating" down with the tide from Conns Mills to Estuary House. Once again the mosquitoes were kept at bay by the use of garlic spray the day before, allowing everyone in attendance to enjoy the barbeque and potluck feast in our new gazebo and the great music provided by local musicians Heather and Jerry, the Abandoned House Band and Colin Hines Band.

Renovations continue on Estuary House as funding allows with more work scheduled to begin in October.

The gazebo has been largely completed with some finishing touches still required. We are looking forward to hosting students again for outdoor learning experiences.

wash Gathering of the Clans went exceptionally well with almost perfect weather. The day started early with a very successful pancake and sausage breakfast at the fire station and ended late with a dance at the Eaton Dining Hall (Lobster Factory).

Entrance gate returns were \$23,356 with 4,366 adults and 672 students purchasing wristbands. It is estimated that there is at least a thousand additional participants not included in the paid wristband count. These include competitors and judges in the Highland Dance and the pipe and drum competitions, participants in the heavyweight Highland games, the Canada Day parade, vendors and the 150 or more volunteers that made the day so special for all involved, residents and visitors alike. Many purchase a wristband anyway, which is greatly appreciated.

Current bank balance (September 2016): \$46,387.92

#### **Future costs**

Did you Know?... that the train station was constructed by layering 2x8 rough planks of local sawn wood - one on top of another. This building of solid wood is probably the most structurally sound building in the village! The bricks came from the brick works that used to be in Brickyard Lane and were added later on as a façade. The only other building like this left in Nova Scotia is in Tatamagouche. The other train stations built this way were at Pictou, Wallace, Oxford and Oxford Junction.
