The old CN Rail Station in Pugwash has been closed to the public since mid March. Village staff meanwhile took the opportunity to give the public areas of the Pugwash library a much overdue renovation. This is the first time the walls


have seen a new coat of paint since the library opened in 1987.

The floors have been sanded and revarnished, cracked plaster has been fixed, breezy ductwork removed and leaky windows caulked. The walls have been painted with colours reflecting the original colours used when the 130 year old train station was built. Not only do the book rooms looks brighter and cleaner, they are quieter and more energy efficient.

We look forward to being able to reopen the building so the public can enjoy the new/old look while using the library.

Covid Litter Clean-Up. Earth Day Litter Clean-up took a different twist this year. Residents joined the Covid Clean-up, pledged to clean a roadway section, chose their own time, practiced social distancing, and engaged in litter picking in the village. A big thanks to all participants!

Floral Display. The Village Commission (VC) and CIB divided up gardening responsibilities and shared costs. CIB undertook flower selection and planting in village gardens, planters, and triangle. VC hired a part-time gardener to focus exclusively on the village gardens. Having a dedicated person focussing on the gardens makes a significant positive difference.

Great Pugwash Tree Blitz 2020. CIB and Friends of the Pugwash Estuary (FOPE) partnered to plant a total of 16 trees on three sites: CEES, Train Station, and Eaton Park. The native species included red oaks, red maples, and sugar maples. Some were to replace trees destroyed by Dorian or that had died while others are part of a succession plan to deal with old

trees. The TD Friends of the Environment Foundation and the Village Commission financially supported these plantings. Twenty-two volunteers contributed to this project!

Community Christmas tree. CIB with the help of the Village Commission planted a Picea pungens "Baby Blue Eyes" Blue Spruce. Standing at 175 cm (5'9"), the tree will grow into a beautiful Christmas tree over the years.



A blue spruce was planted in the same location as the cut Christmas trees have gone for the last several years as a permanent community tree for the future. In a few years time it will be big enough to take over the job. CIB members and helpers giving the tree a good start in life are Roger McCallum, Jerry Draheim and Lorna McCallum







The Friends of the Pugwash Estuary (FOPE), along with the rest of the world, feel blindsided by COVID-19. We were very lucky to have had our Annual General Meeting (AGM) in February and avoided the need for a "virtual AGM" suffered by many organizations but we are still suffering from having planned events like the Earth Day workshop with Clean Foundation on coastal restoration cancelled and not being able to take part in community events like the Gathering of the Clans because it too was cancelled. FOPE did go ahead with a modified bird count which did cover our trails and surrounding areas from Conns Mills to Pugwash Point . Assisted by feeder watchers, we identified nearly 700 birds representing 57 species.

Another project involving FOPE and Communities in Bloom was the Tree Blitz that saw 16 native trees planted around Pugwash to replace some of the trees destroyed by Dorian. Planting was May 28th. Unfortunately, we were able to invite public participation due to COVID-19.

We are hoping that as restrictions are lifted, that we will be able to get back to some limited activities. Of particular concern is that

the events that we rely on for fund-raising will not be allowed. We are considering alternative activities but FOPE does depend on fundraising and donations to remain in operation.

Despite COVID-19, the weather has been very nice for hiking and getting work done on our trails. The trails were closed for a few weeks due to health restrictions but are open again to small groups (10 or less), maintaining social distancing. Hikers are advised to follow trail etiquette and to be aware that the ticks are out and active. As well, the trails are very dry so smoking in strictly prohibited on FOPE property and on the trails. The small craft launch at Estuary House is also open to launch canoes and kayaks. Users are reminded that use of the launch is at your own risk and to park on the gravelled area in front of the barn so as not to block the launch for other users. At least social distancing is not a problem in a 14 foot canoe or kayak!

Enjoy our beautiful Estuary; it is a true asset in these up-setting times.

Curling Season Ended Early

Nomination papers will be available 24 days before election date Complete nomination papers must be delivered to the Village Clerk Treasurer 10 days before the election date. The election will be a Saturday Nomination papers must include signatures from five Village nominating electors.

To be eligible for the Commission, a candidate must be 18 years old or older on the day of the election and Canadian citizen. Candidates for the Village Commission must also normally reside within the Village of Pugwash and have lived in the Village for at least six months.

The same qualifications apply to electors. There is no advance poll or proxy vote permitted.
