

Master Plan Report: Multi-Purpose Centre

As reported in the last Village newsletter, the Municipality of the County of Cumberland has taken over the reins with regard to applications for funding to develop a conceptual design and business management plan in consultation with WHW Architects for the Multi-purpose Centre and new Library. Applications have been resubmitted to various government departments and it is hoped we will be moving forward with this project by late summer.

During this process, the Multi-Purpose Action Committee will, in consultation with the Cumberland Regional Library, the C@P site, the Historical Society, the Pugwash Farmers' Market, the Village Commission and other interested organizations, be looking at possible sites, organizing fundraising strategies and working hard to finally make this multi-phased project a reality. Our goal is to build a new library facility with room for village historical archives and CAP site, as well as a repurposing renovation of the old Train Station building for more program recreational space. The ideal plan will provide indoor and outdoor space for the farmer's market.

Master Plan Report: WATER SUPPLY INVESTIGATION

During the past winter the Municipality of Cumberland carried out groundwater testing in the Pugwash River area. In total, six wells were drilled and one well was pump tested. However, we were not able to identify a source to meet the needs of the Village of Pugwash. This Spring, we have developed another phase of groundwater testing and currently are waiting for dry weather to drill more test wells.

We have been gearing up for the summer season in the village with a number of initiatives.

The first, All Things Blooming Gardening Fair was held in conjunction with the Pugwash Market on May 25. Despite the rainy weather, the fair was a successful community event. There were speakers, a handson stonewall building workshop, a plant sale, soup lunch and a variety of vendors mingling in with the regular market environment.

On June 3, CIB volunteers descended on Harbourview Manor to help the seniors prepare their gardens for the summer. Volunteers turned out two days later to plant flowers in the 20 hanging baskets and 10 barrels. These will soon be installed around the village. In addition to the original banners that have decorated the core of Pugwash in the last couple of years, we are happy to add an additional 20 banners to the streetscape. These will be hung on all the approaches to the village, a colourful way to greet visitors to the area. The banners are a joint project with the Village Commission.

This year, CIB's big community project will be the hard landscaping of the grounds around the playground in Eaton Park. The focus will be better accessibility, safety, more benches and plants that will attract butterflies and pollinating insects.

Pugwash Communities in Bloom couldn't do this work without the support of many businesses, including Pugwash Home Hardware, Sunrise Greenhouses, Inn the Elms, The Chatterbox Cafe, the Pugwash Village Commission and The Municipality of Cumberland County.

Master Plan Report - Tourism

The Village has three new "gateway" signs letting all who approach the Village that we proudly welcome them to Pugwash. They replace the worn out signs that were taken down a couple of years ago.

The Village Hall has a new sign above the entrance door and there's a way-finding Village Map mounted on the east end of the old train station. It is an aerial photo of the Village core area with important landmarks and points of interest added.

The interpretive panels in Eaton Park will be replaced in the new few weeks with new panels and new content.

The Village is also working with the Chamber of Commerce to produce some additional signs within the village to encourage travellers to stop and shop/visit /eat or explore instead of driving right through the village.

Pugwash and Area Community Health

On June 2, the three community health boards (CHBs) in Cumberland County met at the Joggins Fossil Museum for our Annual General Meeting. Reports were heard from the three CHBs. We were each asked to highlight one item in which we have seen change for our CHB. Peter Lewis, Chair of the Pugwash and Area CHB, reported on the progress made in raising the profile of the CHB through articles and photos published in the various print media in our area. This includes It Takes A Village. Indeed, nearly 50 % of those who attended the Numbers 2 Know Wellness clinic in December heard about the event through an article and photo we placed in local media.

Delegates heard two reports at the AGM. Both centred on chronic disease prevention and wellness. The first was the Numbers 2 Know wellness clinics. There were 168 persons who attended five clinics including 33 in Pugwash. With permission, a survey of those attending was done; 68 % of the 168 at-

tendees agreed to the survey. Some findings were: 37 % did not know their "numbers" (blood glucose -sugar, blood pressure, cholesterol, body mass index) before the clinic. About 22 % found out that one or more of the following were outside normal range: blood pressure, blood glucose and cholesterol. Follow up questions such as lifestyle changes and regular check-ups will be asked from time to time. It should be noted that this is all voluntary.

The second report dealt with possible barriers to cancer screening in Nova Scotia. The report presented was done in Cumberland County. Nova Scotia has a low rate of screening for cancer — in the range of 30%. Many cancers can be cured or treated with favourable outcomes if the cancer is detected early enough. Since this is true, why is it that Nova Scotians do not get screened more often? For the survey, 896 residents of the County over the age of 21 participated. The top three "barriers" identified were: 1. What should I be

screened for? 2. Where do I go for screening? 3. Screening makes me worry. Some future considerations/next steps for CHBs may be: public information seminars and to develop a health promotion and education plan. More details about both of these reports are available from Chair Peter Lewis or any Board member. We all have electronic copies. Board members attending the AGM were Peter Lewis, Isabelle Mullaley, Pat Briggins, Gary Brumwell and Maureen Leahey. The CHB will be promoting sunscreen use and skin cancer prevention at HarbourFest on July 27. The Canada Salt Company is donating sunscreen samples again this year. Our next meeting will be in September. We will be hearing a presentation from Michelle Richard from the Pugwash District High Youth Health Centre. We always welcome new members. In 1951, the original purpose of the Gathering of the Clans was to help raise funds to maintain the new Red Cross Hospital. The current hospital serves a large area around Pugwash and, with help and support from those in that area, Pugwash should be home to a new, purpose built facility within the next few years.

Kirkin' o' the Tartan

The Kirkin'o' the Tartan is a church (kirk) service that was actually first celebrated in 1941 to raise funds for British war relief. It harkens to the times of the 1746 Act of Proscription (repealed in 1782) when the English had banned the Scottish tartan. Folk lore later told that Scots would sneak a piece of their tartan into the kirk to be blessed. It is also reminiscent of the times 100 years before Proscription that "Covenanters" met secretly to worship, again avoiding the English.

Whatever the background, it is a celebration of Scottish culture and heritage and the ties and good will Scotland has in North America.

\$5 for adults \$3 students 5 to 12 FREE for children under 5 All dogs brought to the Gathering of the Clans must be on a leash. If you are staying for the fireworks, remember fireworks scare most dogs and hurt their ears. Please consider leaving your pup at home.



Canada Day July 1st

July 1st is not just the Gathering of the Clans, it is Canada Day too. This year, Veterans Canada declared 2013 as the Year of the Korean War Veteran as 2013 is the 60th anniversary of the signing of the Korean War Armistice. Over 26,000 Canadian men and women served in the three year Korean War.

The Canada Day Parade will be at 10am, taking its usual route through the Village streets of Church, Victoria, Water and King. We hope to see some interesting interpretations of the theme of the Korean War Veteran.

The fabulous Canada Day fireworks will be at about 10:15, when it is dark enough to view them.

The entire community benefits directly and indirectly. It benefits directly from the exposure of what we have to offer as a destination to tourists and business and indirectly by supporting important community groups and the North Cumberland Memorial Hospital Auxiliary.

Originally, all proceeds from all sales from all vendor, activity or game booths would go to the hospital auxiliary. As the years went by, vendors just gave a portion of their profits and most of the funds for the Gathering would come from an entrance fee at the gates. This has been \$5 for adults for many years. The Gathering is an expensive event to host, usually costing over \$44,000. Fees and sponsorships are also an important source of funds.

The sanctioned competitions for Highland Dance and the Pipes and Drums are essential to the festival, but are also the more expensive parts of it. In order to help us cover our costs we have six entrance gates run by a variety of organizations that are paid a donation to their own group. We couldn't run the festival without them and are deeply grateful to: The Pugwash and Area Chamber of Commerce, HarbourFest, the Pugwash Legion (Peace Branch 60), the LA Animal Shelter, the Feral Cat Project and the Wentworth C@P Site. Other organizations that are vital to the smooth running of the event and receive a donation for their time is the Pugwash Volunteer Fire Department and the Pugwash and Area Ground Search and Rescue (with additional personnel from the Springhill team).

Over 130 volunteers from Pugwash and area freely give of their time to help towards the success of the festival, which has become the biggest Canada Day event in the County, if not northern Nova Scotia!

Chris Mullaley (243 2276) lives off Pugwash Point Road. Chris is retired as a teacher and past PDHS principal.

Roger Mundle (243 2042) lives on Water Street. Roger delivered petroleum fuels in the area for 28 years. Roger is a farmer and volunteer firefighter. Kathy Redmond (243 2606) has lived in Freedom Lane since January 2012. Kathy volunteers for many organizations and is a past County Councilor. Kathy works for the Legion and the Pugwash Chamber of Commerce.

Solid Waste Rules

- Pick-up day is Tuesdays.
- The Pugwash transfer station is open Tuesdays and Saturdays 8:30am to 4:30pm.
- The transfer station only takes: yard and leaf waste, scrap metal, asphalt shingles and construction/demolition debris.
- Garbage and compost are picked up alternate weeks with recycling picked up the other Tuesday.
- ONE non-clear "privacy bag" per clear, noncoloured bag of residential garbage is permitted.
- Multiple non-clear bags such as solid colour kitchen catchers or grocery bags will no longer be accepted.
- Schedules and separation guides are available at the Village Hall.
- It is an offence to either dump household garbage (including kitty litter) in Village public solid waste receptacles or to remove refundables from them.
