Rod Benjamin—New Chair of the Village Commission



Rod Benjamin was born and raised in Dartmouth, NS

After graduating from Dartmouth High, Rod received a diploma in Electronics Engineering Technology from the Nova Scotia Institute of Technology in Halifax. Following that he completed several technical and administrative courses at the Transport Canada Training Institute at Ottawa and Cornwall Ontario. Rod also completed several business administration courses at the University of New Brunswick through their distant learning program.

Following Rod's graduation from NSIT, he was hired by Transport Canada to serve with the Canadian Coast Guard at their base in Dartmouth. After 5 years with the Coast Guard he transferred to the Transport Canada regional office in Moncton (later to become Nav Canada) where he served as an installation technologist installing ground based radar and navigational aids systems around Atlantic Canada marine stations and airports. From there Rod became the Navaid Maintenance Management Specialist for Atlantic Canada airports. Rod's last two years of employment were as a Technical Operations Coordinator at the Air Traffic Control centre in Riverview, NB from which he retired in 2002. Rod continues to do some contract work in the Air Navigation field with another company part time.

Rod Benjamin was a cottager in Pugwash since the early 1960's. In 1980 he purchased his family's cottage on Water St., Pugwash and immediately following retirement they sold their house in Riverview, NB and moved permanently to Pugwash. The old cottage came down and a house was built on the same spot at the end of Water Street. Rod says that it did bother him for years that he was paying taxes in Pugwash but not able to vote; "My solution to the problem was to move permanently to Pugwash where I now can vote and serve on the Village Commission".

As well as serving on the Pugwash Village Commission, Rod is also involved with the Pugwash Yacht Club as commodore and with the Anglican Parish of Pugwash and River John as a synod delegate.

Rod and his wife – Judy, have 3 children – Jacqueline, Susan and Michael, and 2 grand children – Chase and Oliver. His mother and two brothers live in the Dartmouth area and his father is living in Florida.

We all join in wishing Rod every success as he takes over the reigns at the Village Commission.

Work to Begin Soon on the Waterfront

Each of the past 3 years has seen an increasing degree of damage to the seawall and walkway in Eaton Park. Costs to repair the washout have escalated from under \$2,000 per year to over \$6,000 last year. In November 2008 two severe storms were accompanied by significant storm surge leaving in their wake significant damage. Repairing the current damage could have run as high as \$30,000. But replacing the pathway to its current height only to be washed away again this fall is not the answer to the problem and is not a sustainable strategy to deal with the growing problem of rising sea levels and increased storm surges along the Northumberland



The Village Commission has sought funding from other levels of government

to make major modifications to the seawall area which will provide for a long term solution to this problem. The Village has secured \$131,000 in funding from the Build Canada Fund which is a partnership between the Federal and Provincial Governments. That funding along with \$50,000 from Cumberland County and the Village's own contribution of \$10-15,000 will allow the seawall to be raised by as much as 3 feet in places and a new hard surfaced walkway installed. Work is expected to be completed before the fall.

Friends of the Pugwash Estuary

Once again the Friends of the Pugwash Estuary have embarked on a busy summer season. The May session of the Community Aquatic Monitoring Program (CAMP) has been completed. Once a month CAMP tests 6 sites along the Estuary, primarily for species and numbers of fish, but also for salinity, oxygen content and presence of algae. A probe to continuously record temperature and a monitor for invasive species have been installed in the harbour.

Jill Rushton, summer student, started work on June 1. Jill has a BA in Environmental Science and is enrolled in Cartology Certificate Program at NSCC. Jill's key responsibilities are to develop a map of the Pugwash River Watershed, map specific land parcels owned by the Nature Conservancy, and plan a number of habitat restoration projects on streams that flow into the Pugwash River. Other plans include a float and information booth on July 1, estuary tours during HarbourFest, a canoe/kayak flotilla down the river, and a photo contest. This year the Friends have teamed up with Communities in Bloom (CIB) and acquired funding from the Nova Scotia Youth Conservation Corp (NSYCC) to hire 2 students for July and August. These students will work half time with Jill on the Estuary and half time with CIB on Village beautification projects. Meet all 3 students at the Canada Day booth.

From July 9-11, we will be hosting an International Student/Young Pugwash workshop, where a dozen international youth leaders will meet to determine ISYP's direction, to develop strategies for a sustainable youth peace network and to lay the groundwork for a major youth conference in Pugwash in 2010.



During this time, the PPE will also be hosting a visit from over 50 Canadian youth who are participating in the Shad Valley program. This program is for high-potential students, and builds on an academic foundation of mathematics, science, engineering, and entrepreneurship to develop intellectual excellence.

There will be public events taking place during this workshop, and we are looking forward to our friends in the community meeting these bright young individuals and hearing their ideas.

One public event will be our 4th annual Dinner of Peace, on July 11th. Our guest speaker for this lobster dinner will be Talatbek Masadykov, Chief of the Political Affairs Unit for the United Nations Assistance Mission in Afghanistan (UNAMA.) As well, we will have a special guest with a local connection. Nova Scotia-born, world-renowned soprano Barbara Hannigan (daughter of Tatamagouche resident and PPE member Ed Hannigan) will be gracing our stage with some selections from her vast repertoire.

Cape Cod Wood Siding Percherons are Coming to Pugwash



The Gathering of the Clans is pleased to announce that Harrison's Home Hardware Building Centre has managed to arrange for the Cap Cod Wood Siding Percherons to be in Pugwash for the 2009 Gathering of the Clans.

This 8 in hand team are arriving on June 30 and will be on display for the public to view in the evening at the parking lot for the Pugwash Library on Durham St. They will be in the parade the next morning, and back on display for the day.

These horses have been competing for 14 years. They have won the 6 horse hitch 53 times, second place 19 times and third place 7 times. They are also a 5 time winner of the North American All Breeds Classic Series, 2 time winner of the World Percheron Congress, 5 time winner of the National Percheron Show, 2 time winner of the Calgary Stampede Percheron Show, and 3 time winner of the All Breeds Show at the Toronto Royal Winter Fair.

The history of the Percherons and Cape Cod Wood Siding began in the 1930's when Hedley Creelman started the business. The Percherons were part of the workforce, hauling logs to the mills. Today, they are the ambassadors for Cape Cod Wood Siding.

Don't Leave Garbage Behind!


Signs will be installed on all garbage and recycling bins placed around the Village this year which bear the warning that those bins are for litter and recyclables only and not for household garbage or bagged garbage from vehicles. Violators will be fined if identified.

This measure comes after many incidents last summer and fall where bags of household garbage were dumped off in Eaton Park and other locations around the Village. Cumberland County has provided for curbside collection of garbage including all cottage lanes from May to September.

Anyone who sees a vehicle unloading garbage where it should not be is asked to call the Village Clerk (243-2946) who will alert the RCMP. The Village Commission thanks everyone for helping to keep our Village clean and attractive for residents and visitors.

The Friends of the Margaret King School Society have made significant progress in the development of Phase 1 of our three phase project. The sprucing up of the existing structure has almost been completed thanks to a huge effort of many volunteers working under the direction of our project manager George Gillis.



Also thanks to the support of our Municipal Representative Al Gillis and endorsements from the Village Commission and the Pugwash Peace Exchange we were able to receive Municipal financial support in the amount of \$3,000. towards the completion of Phase 1 and some startup on Phase 2 (a permanent monument to the Margaret King and Doherty Creek schools).

We have also applied for additional funding from the Eaton Foundation which will go towards completing Phase 2 and Phase 3, permanent interpretive panels on Pugwash Junction Road. These panels will document the histories of Cyrus Eaton as a young man, Margaret King, the Margaret King School, the Doherty Creek School as well as that of Pugwash Junction.

Our thanks to all the volunteers who have donated time, materials and plants over the last couple of weeks. Remember, the School's - and our Society's motto: "Together We Achieve the Extraordinary!" - and we are doing just that.
