On July 1st, Eaton Stage will again rock to the sounds of Rawlins Cross, one of Canada's most accomplished and beloved Celtic bands.

The band was formed in St. John's in 1989 by song writing brothers Dave Panting (guitar and mandolin) and Geoff Panting (keyboards and accordion) and Ian McKinnon (highland pipes and tin whistle). Since then, Rawlins Cross has been at the vanguard of the fusion of Celtic traditional music with the rhythms of rock, pop and world beat music. Equally at ease with a soulful Highland Air (MacPherson's Lament) or a raucous party song (Colleen, Wild Rose, Reel 'n' Roll), Rawlins Cross never fails to electrify its faithful fans. Rawlins Cross is always a "fan favourite" on the North American and European music festival circuit consistently earning return engagements.

Rawlins Cross reunited in 2008 after a six year hiatus and released Anthology, a compilation of its best recorded songs. This was followed with the release of Heart Head Hands in 2010.

Rawlins Cross last played Pugwash in 2000. They will follow other popular local artists and bands who will play on Eaton Stage through the afternoon and evening of July 1st. All this just for just \$5!!

The Thinkers Lodge Society is pleased to confirm the we have achieved a critical milestone for the organization, the community of Pugwash and our region.

The Thinkers Lodge Society and the Pugwash Parks Commissioners have signed a landmark partnership agreement to work together to celebrate and preserve the legacy of Thinkers Lodge National Historic Site.

Through committee work happening within the Operations Group of the Thinkers Lodge Society (TLS), the two organizations are actively working together to craft the details of what will happen at the property during 2015 and beyond.

A key priority is to increase awareness that the property is fully open and ready for business after the long restoration process. Activities already in motion include that the Thinkers Lodge National Historic Site will be listed in the NS Tourism flagship marketing tools "the Doers & Dreamers Guide" and "novascotia.com" for the first time. The Lodge will also be advertising in the 2015 Northumberland Shore Tourism Guide for the first time.

Village Municipal Water Supply Project

The Pugwash Water Supply has been steadily progressing throughout the winter as we plan for the 2015/16 budget year. The water source exploration portion of the project is wrapping up and we are moving into the engineering phase of the project.

A request for proposals will be issued for the engineering design of the water distribution system and treatment plant this Spring. The engineering work involved includes pipe sizing, pipe routing, pumping and pressure modeling, water treatment processes and the design of all other required infrastructure.

The engineering work is scheduled to be completed in the fall of 2015.

Water Sample Bottles

If you would like to have your well tested for minerals, there are sample bottles available from the Village Hall. Two different companies will test for either 30 elements or for fewer, specified elements. The cost varies with the range of testing and is the responsibility of the home owner.

Water test bottle for bacteria are available from the Pugwash hospital. These must be delivered to the Amherst hospital. Costs and specific instructions come with the test bottle.




Making a Difference in Our

BUTT-OUT PUGWASH DAY - May 1

At the request of Pugwash Communities in Bloom, the Pugwash Village Commission has proclaimed May 1st as Butt-Out Pugwash Day when the community is encouraged to refrain from smoking in public places and to acknowledge the importance of smoke-free spaces in our environment.

This project is the collaborative effort of PDHS students, CIB, the Pugwash and Area Community Health Board, Village Commission, local businesses and organizations. This project is generously supported by a Wellness Grant from The Community Health Board.

The high school student social justice committee, under the guidance of the school nurse, Michelle Richard, is organizing a presentation for a May 1 school assembly on smoking both cigarettes and marijuana. Visual art students, under the guidance of art teacher Louise Cloutier, are creating stand-alone sculptural cigarette butts for use on May 1 to get the public's attention. At the end of the assembly, the students will take to the streets with CIB volunteers, handing out information about smoking cessation and a smoke and cigarette butt-free environment in key locations in the village.

Pugwash and Area Chamber of Commerce will encourage businesses to display Butt-Out Pugwash posters, hand out flyers to customers, and consider purchasing and installing cigarette butt receptacles near their entrances.

Please be advised that applications will be juried by a panel. Priority will be given to vendors who will provide different and complimentary products to existing vendors to expand and diversify the market offering.

Approximately 40 people attended the Friends of the Pugwash Estuary (FOPE) Annual General Meeting on Saturday, February 28th. Doug van Hemessen and Danielle Horne of Nature Conservancy Canada gave an informative presentation of where they own lands in the Estuary, ecological benefits of eel grass and where it is found in the Estuary, work they've done on invasive species (green crab and buckthorn), and continuing projects/developments in those areas.

A Community Recognition Program was instigated at the AGM. This would recognize people, not just for their involvement in FOPE, but for contributions to the community at large. The first, and very deserving, recipients were Bala and David Mehta.

Also at the AGM, the Friends of the Pugwash Estuary initiated the formation of a foundation to help fund Education and Research activities in the Estuary. It will be called the Alice M. Power Environmental Education Foundation, and the initial focus will be PDHS programs. The future vision includes expanding to other schools, universities, and interested researchers.

Exterior renovations at Estuary House have been completed, with new doors, windows and siding. Several days of trail cutting have seen the roughing out of a hiking trail of approximately 4 kilometres. Work will continue on this after the snow melts.

This summer should see the completion of a gazebo on the property. The gazebo will be large enough to accommodate a full class of students and will greatly extend the season for the use of the property. Mosquito season currently preludes productive activity at the site for long stretches of time. Eventually, the gazebo will contain interpretive panels depicting all aspects of the Estuary.

Other projects, including interior house renovations, the creation of a historical document, and green crab monitoring are in the planning stages.

April is the main FOPE fundraising month. Tickets will be sold throughout the month on a beautiful handcrafted quilt and several barbeques will be held. Everyone is invited to drop by Estuary House on Sunday, April 19 from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. Refreshments will be served and donations accepted. Combined with the matching funds from Scotiabank, the goal is to raise \$10,000.



Collaborative Projects

The Village is collaborating with two very important groups on several projects. One of the projects is to extend the coverage area of the village banners. The Village has been working with **Communities in Bloom** on this project. Pictured here is one of the new banner designs.

The Village is also working with the **Pugwash** and Area Chamber of Commerce on a project called *First Impressions Heritage Vignette Downtown Enhancement Project*. This will include interpretive signs, benches and garbage bins.

Election for Village Commission

Two positions as village commissioner are up for election this June 6th. Dave Farley is retiring as Commissioner after serving six years, two of those years as chair of the commission. Charlie Gould filled in the final year of a vacant position and may re-offer for another, full three year term this year. The terms of the commissioners are staggered to allow for as much consistency as possible, the new commissioners learning form the more experienced commissioners. To serve as a commissioner you must be an eligible elector of the Village. This means you must be a Canadian citizen, a full time resident of the village and aged 19 or over.

There are five commissioners. These are volunteers who have an interest in what and how village services are offered. Commissioners work as a democratic team while looking at village affairs and often serve on other committees, particularly the Master Plan committees. Much of what commissioners may or may not do is outlined in the Municipal Government Act. The village runs its meetings as according to Roberts Rules of Order. The policies and bylaws of the Village and the services offered can be found on the village website.

If you have an interest in how services are delivered in Pugwash, in planning for the long and short term future of the village and you can work in a team, consider running for the commission.

Cancer Patient Navigator Visits Pugwash and Area Community Health Board

When a person is diagnosed with cancer, the effects on the person are many including physical and emotional. A Cancer Patient Navigator is a nurse who works with the patient and their family and their cancer care team throughout their treatment and follow-up. A person diagnosed with cancer usually has many questions. The Cancer Patient Navigator can support the person through all of this. One testimonial from a patient was "It was the Patient Navigator who identified questions and things that needed more explaining. I learned then and there that she was the 'go to person' ".

Cathy Bragg-Gilmore is the Cancer Patient Navigator who works full time in Cumberland County. Ms. Bragg-Gilmore spoke to members of the Pugwash and Area Community Health Board at their February meeting. Members were quite impressed by the very important work she does. The County has had a Cancer Patient Navigator since 2009. There have been about 476 referrals since the Program started. Most referrals are from patients themselves. Others can refer with the consent of the patient. In the County, there are about 300 cancer diagnoses each year.

Each cancer patient has different needs and will deal with cancer in different ways. The Cancer Patient Navigator helps the patient with individual needs including: understanding the patient's cancer diagnosis and treatment; how to prepare to make decisions about treatments; how to connect with community health care professionals; how to connect with support groups and other resources in the community; helping to coordinate the patient's care; helping the patient to enrol in assistance programs for which the patient may qualify including family pharmacare, disability benefits and transportation programs. The Cancer Patient Navigator does not provide medical care; the patient who need such care needs to contact their family doctor or go to the closest emergency centre.

Ms. Bragg-Gilmore, as Cancer Patient Navigator, provides current information to cancer patients and their families to ensure they understand: their diagnosis, their treatment plan, symptom management and available supports. 
