Pugwash Water System Nears Completion

Pugwash residents will soon get the go ahead to make connections to the Municipal water system

Crews are flushing and disinfecting the final sections of the distribution network this week. As long as sampling results indicate no presence of bacteria, then customers will be allowed to begin the connection process as soon as next week. This will be to the curb stop at their property boundary. Final connections inside the building will be able to be made later in September or early October. A diagram of how to this connection made is shown of page 2 of this newsletter and is available from the village website. Water hook-up contractors are listed on page 12.

Work at the water treatment plant is nearly complete. The treatment process is removing iron and

manganese to levels well below the Canadian Drinking Water Guidelines.

The final pieces of equipment, at the chlorine analyser/booster station, will be operational starting the week of September 24th. Once this equipment is working fully the municipality will be in a position to supply water to customers.

Once water is being supplied to customers, crews will start work on fixing property damage cause during the various stages of installation. For example, the blue plastic pipes will be removed and capsized areas filled in.

The wells, reservoir and treatment plant are in an area protected by bylaws and a local advisory committee which include representatives from the village, ATV and snowmobile associations and the municipality.

Eaton Stage Construction delayed but not cancelled

After at least two years of consultation and discussion with architects, the final design of a new stage was released for tender in July. The tender closed in August with two bids made that were significantly greater than the \$450,000 budget the Village had set aside for the project. Not having the final plans or any quote available prior to setting a budget, this amount was estimated as being the most the Village could be expected to fund for the proposed plans.

\$100,000 of this amount is to come from Village's and the Gathering of the Clans' capital reserves. The rest of the funds are hoped to come from other levels of government and corporate or private business funding.

The Village is now investigating what changes can be made to reduce costs, including changing the deadline and payment schedule, and increase funding income. There is believed to be a chance that some construction could still start before freeze-up so that we can have the venue and park ready for July 1st.



The new stage is designed to include a dressing room, green room, artist's bathroom, stage manager/technician's area, a crossover area to allow for flexible stage entrance and exit and bench storage.

Multi Purpose Centre Update


The Pugwash Multipurpose Centre is one of the components of the Pugwash Waterfront Development project. When the need for a new library was identified, we looked into the other needs and wants of the community and the region. Following a series of stakeholder engagement sessions, it was identified that other community space, such as activity rooms and meeting space was needed in the area.

A site selection process was used to identify the ideal site for the Multipurpose centre. The Municipality has acquired a site for the Pugwash multipurpose centre in the heart of Pugwash: the corner of Highway 6 and Durham Street.

Over the past several years, the Municipality has worked with the Pugwash Multipurpose Centre Steering Committee, the community, and consultants at Architecture49 to define the necessary spaces to be housed within the building and the general layout of the space.

To date, we have completed:

- Community and stakeholder consultation
- Site selection process
- definition of the building components
- acquired the site on the corner of Highway 6 and Durham Street
- preliminary design of the building



Components of the preliminary design:

- library space
- meeting and programming room
- multipurpose rooms with removable walls
- community living room with a fire place and verandah
- kitchen space
- washrooms and a shower
- three verandahs
- a 240 linear foot indoor walking circuit

Lets be ever vigilant around our children and keep them safe.




The annual Terry Fox Run will start at the Pugwash Co-Op Carpark on Sunday, September 16th.

Marilyn & Friends' Feral / Stray Cat Spay & Neuter **Program**

Feral, stray and homeless cats in your neighborhood are trying to survive a very difficult life that humans have sentenced them to by abandoning them and by not spaying and neutering.

Many feral and stray homeless cats have been spayed and neutered through this program, which helps keep the population of homeless cats down. The weekly on-line auction is helping with expenses and the summer vard sales have also raised a good amount of funds. Thankfully, several of the strays and semi-feral cats have been found permanent homes and many kittens found have been socialized to be able to also find homes.

The program is very thankful to have a few foster homes who have kindly reached out to allow homeless cats to come and stay and be cared for till homes are found and we could surely use another few such homes to be able to call if homes have to found quickly and other foster homes already have cats they are fostering .Please let me know if you would be willing to become a foster home for periods of time. Cats and kittens are vet checked and parasite treated prior to going into a foster home.

We are very grateful to the many people chose to donate their refundable bottles and pop cans to the program. Donations can be made at various donation jars in several communities which helps with vet costs.

If you know of any home interested in bringing a new cat or kitten into their heart and home or barn please have them contact Marilyn & Friends' and there just might be the perfect cat to fit your or their needs. Thank you to everyone in the many communities who support the Spay and Neuter Program and realize that vetting the cats are the very best way to control the numbers of kitten litters being born and decreasing the number of feral cats and homeless strays in our back yards.

All the various events, the fireworks, parade security, the gates and bankers are all run by volunteers and all deserve big thanks! Thanks also go to the many sponsors whose generosity help make this historic event a success. With several financially successful events held in recent years, the Gathering of the Clans is in a position to assist the funding of a new stage in contributing \$40,000 towards the cost of construction.

Did you know?

The Gaelic street signs in Pugwash date back to when the first Gathering of the Clans was held in the village in 1951, making Pugwash the first community in North America to have bilingual English Gaelic signs.

The Village of Pugwash was incorporated as a Village on August 1st 1948. To celebrate this, with funding help from the Municipality, the Village celebrated in real down home style with music, song and cake. A couple of hundred people were in Eaton Park to enjoy the early evening event.
